What is WIC?

A supplemental food program that offers:

- ▶ Monthly benefits for healthy foods, such as:
 - ▶ Milk, yogurt, cheese, soy beverages
 - ▶ Cereal, brown rice, corn tortillas, whole wheat bread/pasta
 - ▶ Fresh, canned or frozen fruit and veggies
 - ▶ Dried or canned beans
 - ▶ Eggs/tofu
 - ▶ Peanut butter
 - ▶ Canned tuna, salmon, sardines, mackerel
 - ▶ Juice
 - ▶ Baby foods, infant cereal
 - ▶ Formula
- ▶ Nutrition & Breastfeeding education
 - ▶ Prenatal nutrition
 - ▶ Eating tips for your child
 - ▶ Healthy recipes
 - ▶ Breastfeeding support
 - ▶ Parenting tips
- ▶ A community of support on staff
 - ▶ Nutritionist
 - ▶ Breastfeeding peer counselors
 - ▶ Lactation specialist
 - ▶ Nurses
 - ▶ Bilingual staff
 - ▶ Referrals
 - ▶ Healthcare professionals
 - ▶ Social services



Who Qualifies for WIC?

▶ Children

- ▶ Birth to age 5
- ▶ In foster care

▶ Women

- ▶ Pregnant
- ▶ Postpartum
- ▶ Breastfeeding

▶ If you fall under those categories and are receiving:

- ▶ Medicaid
- ▶ SNAP/Food stamps
- ▶ ADC

You automatically qualify for WIC!
